Pastoral Column — July 2023

It has already been a year since I first arrived here at Bethel. Little did I know that I would be missing all these weeks because of my health issues. For those of you that didn't know, I went to the ER on June 13th because I was having abdominal pain. After many tests, the doctor discovered that I had an infection in my body and it was due to my gallbladder. On Thursday June 15, the doctors took the gallbladder out and on Saturday I was released to go home.

Unfortunately, I began to struggle with my breathing the following Sunday and on Monday I decided to go back to the ER to triage my situation. It turned out that my right lung had fluid in it and there also was fluid leaking from the common bile duct. On Wednesday June 21, the doctors put a port in to drain the fluid in my abdomen. Although they released me to go home, I was still struggling with my breathing.

One thing I discovered is when the doctor prescribes specific medicine, there is a good reason for it. I wasn't sure if the muscle relaxant or the nerve blockers was helping me, so I stopped taking it the fourth day. I quickly realized that it was not only necessary, but it also would have helped me with my breathing. I also recognized that the pain meds prescribed to me helped me sleep at night.

Although it has been three weeks, I am now 90% recovered. My appetite has been good, and my lungs are getting stronger each day. I know for a fact that I would not be where I am today if it wasn't for the prayer gatherings you all had while I was at the hospital.



I also saw God's hand move in my life as I was gifted with a much-needed recliner to help me manage my days resting. Finally, when Pat Martin brought all the cards and well wishes to my house and I read each of them, I was moved to tears.

What is my takeaway from all this? I won't take any visitations to a hospital lightly anymore. Each time I see someone recovering from a procedure or an illness, my heart will be there with them because I finally know what it is like to be in the hospital, let alone have surgery. This was my first surgery in my life and first time being admitted in the hospital. I hope it will be my last and I know I will come back stronger, both physically and spiritually thanks to all of you.



I want to thank all my leaders who have tirelessly organized each Sunday service with the upmost care. It was good worshiping with everyone on Sunday July 2 and a special shout out to Rev. Dr. Steven Hundley for preaching the Word. I know my heart wants to come back sooner than later, but I hope to take the pulpit again on August 6 as we move forward into a brand-new sermon series. Becky Crouch Recognized for 50 Years of Service to Girl Scouts

Warrenton resident Becky Crouch was recently recognized for 50 years of participation and outstanding volunteer service at the 2023 Annual Meeting of the Girl Scout Council of the Nation's Capital held in Germantown, Maryland.

Originally from the rural eastern shore of Maryland, Crouch began her Girl Scout journey as a child. But it wasn't until she moved to Fauquier County in 1977 and her two daughters were recruited to join the Girl Scouts that she became more involved in the organization.

Crouch said she became a troop leader after both her daughters were recruited to join the Girl Scouts.

"When I became a mother, and the recruiting happened at my daughter's elementary school, that's when I then became active," she told FauquierNow. "I have two daughters who both went all the way through 12 years of scouting, and both of my girls and I are lifetime members."

Although her daughters are now grown, Crouch said her granddaughter was the most recent family member to join the Girl Scouts.

"It's really fun to have a third-generation Girl Scout," Crouch said.

Throughout her Girl Scout career, Crouch has served as the leader of Brownie, Junior, Cadette and Senior troops in Fauquier.

She's also held leadership positions at the local (Service Unit), regional (Association) and Council levels. Crouch has represented the Council at National Conferences in Miami, Long Beach, Fort Worth, Kansas City, Atlanta and Indianapolis. Currently, she serves on the Service Unit Team as treasurer, a position she's held for more than 20 years.

Over her many years of service, Crouch has received several accolades, including the Knox Award -- the highest award for an adult volunteer. She has also met "wonderful adult women" who Crouch said she would have otherwise never crossed paths with.



But Crouch emphasized the accolades she received and places she's traveled were just "a plus."

"I do this for the girls," Crouch said.

When Crouch started as a troop leader, many of the girls she led were in first or second grade, and some now have children of their own. She said watching them grow "into wonderful adults and remodels" has been one of the greatest joys in her life. She said she takes pride in the feeling that she made a difference in the lives of the young girls she mentored.

"It's rewarding to see what the scouts did for them," Crouch said.

Bethel Computer Mission Ministry

As many of you know my work in Kenya started two years ago with bringing over laptops to two schools in the Mombasa area of Kenya. This is an update of where we are today. After we outfitted the schools with laptops, we started helping with sustainable food and Christian education in a village.



The village had not seen rain in 5 years as I recall; God's timing at work. We have over 25 acres of maize, beans, and other greens growing in the very desolate area outside Mombasa called Mariakani.






We teach Saturday lessons on computers and children's church. This includes a meal for the approximately 70 children we work with including freshly baked bread. Thirty percent of the children are Muslim. God is using us in this village, and it seems to be just the start. They need fresh water but a well is not possible because the water table is too salty.

I know many of you have prayed and donated to Omar (pictured right). He is on chemo and has been very sick and in the hospital from the cancer treatment. This little guy is so tough. He was asked when he went in for his eye surgery if he was afraid. He said, "No, I have Jesus."

Although I have never met Omar (pictured left), I have been helping him through Angie Mitchell out of St Louis. She works with The Royals School where we

installed the computers and does ministry in the villages, so we have some common goals. I sent Angie a laptop to help Omar with his education because he cannot go to school and then learned his mother was paying to charge the laptop; things we never think about because we take electricity for granted. We purchased a small solar charging system and Omar is happy because his laptop can stay charged. The family is happy now that they have lights at nighttime. Omar and his mother were Muslims when Angie first met them a few years ago. The father remains Muslim.

There is a great hunger for the Word, and we really could use funds for Swahili Bibles. We have 12 Bibles now but need many more because the area we are covering has over 500 people. Even Muslim parents are hungry for the Word since we started teaching because the children are listening better! I was told yesterday the seeds we gave have reached people we don't even know - it's like Jesus' teaching. I never dreamed this was going to happen when I started! Debbie Bowers asked if I could use school uniforms and I said I would find them a home.

I don't have time to tell you about the housing upgrades we did for three ministers or the two pastors taking a Homiletic class at Ethos College here in Warrenton. Of course, this is via the Internet. God is moving and this is just the start! It's humbling to be able to boast about all that God is allowing me to be involved in.

If you feel called to help with clean water, food, children's or women's challenges, please let me know. I have two avenues that we can donate to (e3kids or Angie's church in St Louis) or you can give to the Missions fund at Bethel, and I will distribute the funds from there.

I have friends heading over in August for a medical mission in Samia Kenya. If you are feeling a pull let me know how you would like to help.

I post pictures and updates on my Facebook page at least once a week so you can follow the journey there. The pictures are amazing and their smiles and the light in their eyes are breathtaking; it was not like that when we started this journey.
