Our Beautiful Easter Banners

The following is an excerpt from the Easter Sunday bulletin from April 19, 2009

"Thank you to Sue Smith who designed our beautiful Easter banners which will be in our sanctuary now until Pentecost – the time period known as the Great Fifty Days. This project required countless hours and we are very grateful to Sue and her team of helpers who helped with some of the assembly work. Thank you, Sue and your team for this wonderful addition to our Easter celebration."

Sue Smith and her young daughter, Riley, attended Bethel starting about Christmas 2008. They attended most Sundays. One Sunday after church (as Lent approached), Sue lingered in her pew. I went to check on her and realized she was sketching something. Sue looked at me with tears in her eyes saying that God had just given her a vision of a rising Christ during Pastor Marty's sermon. She showed me a sketch and said she'd like to make a banner for Easter. I was amazed at what she'd drawn. I called Marty over and we talked about her vision and we all agreed she should do it. Turns out Sue is an artist. And the rest is history.

Sue kept us apprised of her progress, but as life would happen, she agreed she needed some last-minute help. She brought the banners to the social hall early in Holy Week and there were several people who helped her put the finishing touches on them. I know Geneice Kemper and Donna Broadbent were among them, but I'm not sure who else? It was late on the Saturday evening before Easter when Sue, her husband Mark, Earl & Geneice Kemper, Pastor Marty and I gathered in the sanctuary to hang the banners. (I was the photographer and encourager!) Earl was fearless on the tall ladders. Marty was his assistant. Geneice and Sue made sure everything was straight. The first few years, the banners which are now on the side walls, were hung on the stabilizer bolts.



Sue's vision had almost come to life. After everything was finished and the sanctuary was readied for Easter morning, we all just sat in that sacred space silent and stunned at the beauty of Jesus rising from the tomb. The butterflies, dark ones at the tomb, then lighter colored ones rising in the air; the empty cross in the middle. What a vision.

It wasn't long after Easter that Sue and her family moved away, I think to Wisconsin. When I returned to Bethel in 2022 and saw the Easter banners still being hung and still inspiring us, I tried to find her with a Google search. I thought I had found her, but alas, the Sue Smith I found was not an artist. I wanted to let her know the banners are still hung with care on the day before Easter and continue to touch and inspire those who see them.

CHIMING IN FROM THE BELL ROOM




Kevin Lee donated 20 Banker Boxes, which hold 30 dozen cookies nicely for taking into the prison.

Landscaping and yard care has begun with the arrival of spring. Blue Ridge Property Services LLC has been mowing the grounds and installed new mulch in all of the beds surrounding the Bethel buildings. Roger Broadbent, Duane Williamson, and Roy and Bonnie Pool have been removing shrubs, trimming bushes and planting flowers to prepare Bethel's beds and doorways for the Holy Week and summer season.







Infrastructure Grant Decision

Bethel Congregation,

We received notice that the *Bethel application for infrastructure grant funding from the Northern Virginia District Strategy Team was not awarded.* You will recall that there was \$2,000,000 available to be distributed to qualifying churches, the total individual church request ceiling was \$200,000.

There were 56 churches that applied for a total of \$9,927,349 in funding so very few grants were awarded. We of course are very disappointed that Bethel was not successful but are happy for those churches who have projects that have greater needs and who will be able to correct their infrastructure issues.

As a part of the application process each church had to commit to raising 15% of the total request from donations from the congregation. Bethel has raised to date \$25,000. At the congregation information meeting held in January, it was stated that, if our application was not successful, the funds raised would be used toward the top priority that was stated on the application. Bethel's top priority is repairing and replacing where needed, the shingles on the towers and the entire roof over the original 1834 building, and over the additions where needed. That work has been given to the roofing vendor with the lowest bid and will begin Monday, April 28.

We thank all of you who have committed funding – it is going for a very good cause. We have experienced leaks over the past couple of years so it will be a relief that they will be taken care of. The project is in the hands of the Bethel Board of Trustees if you have any questions!
